

It (Arizona's vision) seems to be a continuing theme of this column, and quite frankly, I would rather highlight activities this Foundation sponsors to improve student and educator experiences instead of how the Foundation will continue to fill, as our resources allow, voids left unfunded or undervalued. But, I still have not seen the courage at the state level to invest in this topic, so, as I suggested in the previous newsletter, our Foundation will continue to focus on our mission: support Sahuaro's students, faculty, alumni and supporting We continue to take the community. perspective that the Foundation will weather any administration (local, state or federal) and we won't be waiting for improvements to materialize; we will be making our own improvements and growing our influence. We are still in this for the long haul.

As suggested in the earlier newsletter, long hauls require patience, planning and funding. To address planning, we now have a budget committee whose fundamental task is to test and align the board's goals with the reality of historical, current and projected fiscal limitations. We often found ourselves reacting to requests and great ideas without adequate tools to balance good intentions with fiscal responsibility. An approved budget will allow various committees and projects to move at a faster pace and with more autonomy. foundation received a number of generous contributions and the board is evaluating options to safe the capital and instead fund from the dividends of these contributions. ## A Challenge: Eternalizing the Cougar

Can you believe it? Sahuaro turns fifty in just twelve months! Fall 2017 marks the beginning of the school's fiftieth year, and this provides a golden opportunity to celebrate. And, there is a lot to make us proud.

Some of us remember the transformation of the desert as foundations were dug and walls were erected. Innovation was the watchword with the state's first three-level high school library, and one of the first ten-lane tracks. Our "modular" schedule accommodated differentiated learning by extending some class periods to 90-minutes and shortening others to 20 minutes. Sixty-minute conference periods twice a week allowed for one-on-one and small group learning where students were provided extra assistance.

The first graduating class, the Class of 1970, enjoyed being seniors twice...not because 100% of the students were retained, but because as juniors, there was no senior class. The school quickly filled to the brim, boasting some 2400 students. And, for a period of time, several classes from Wrightstown Elementary School shared the campus.

Traditions were being established even before the school opened its doors. The reds and blues (scarlet and navy) of the sunset were chosen as school colors, and the mighty cougar that roams the surrounding desert to this day became the mascot. J.O.E. Cougar was ever present on the athletic fields and courts, rooting our teams onto victory. (How many know that J.O.E. is an acronym for Job of Eternalizing the Cougar?) Speaking of victories, the Sahuaro basketball team won the state championship in its second year of existence. Many remember the trip to the Colosseum in Phoenix in the spring of 1970.

Having built the school without a football field, Friday night home games were staged at high schools that were playing away games. In addition, the band, as well as busloads of Cougars, travelled to Buena High School in Sierra Vista with numbers rivaling the home crowd. To this day, the cheer squad and spirit groups have rallied the school to victory.

The new auditorium (now named after Henry D. Egbert, our founding principal) opened with the beginning of school in Fall 1968 and hosted federal title program performers including Milt Jackson and the Modern Jazz Quartet, and the Paul Horn Flute Ensemble. And, who can forget our own Sahuaro Up-With-People Sing Out, or Scott Carter's Mark Twain show, complete with a lit cigar on stage?

Sahuaro made its mark statewide coming out of the gate. Students in the music program dominated All-State. The theatre program was exemplary, and the three-quarters thrust stage was another innovation. The industrial arts program included a full complement of automotive, metal, wood and photography shops. Our DECCA program was active, and students engaged in work study programs citywide.

Student Council and Homeroom Federation were vital. Delegates from Sahuaro were sent to Boys and Girls State, and Anytown. Student government leaders were invited to "take over" the City of Tucson for a day, shadowing the appointed officials and learning about the community.

Adding up the number of state championships, honors, awards, and academic successes, it is no surprise that Sahuaro remains a school of choice. Founded with a hand-selected cadre of committed and talented faculty and staff, much of that spirit remains today.

Having enjoyed the Sahuaro Silver Celebration twenty-five years ago, who would have predicted how quickly we would arrive at this moment? Sahuaro Alums represent portions of six decades, as well as all walks of life.

Let's all be challenged to engage in "Eternalizing the Cougar."

Let's continue the celebration!



## For Graduating Seniors & CE Scholarships/Grants for SHS Faculty & Staff.



The SHS Cougar Foundation again proudly offers scholarships for SHS graduating seniors: Sahuaro Cougar Foundation Senior Scholarships and Sahuaro Cougar Foundation Red and Blue Scholarships. Both scholarships (Senior and Red & Blue) offer \$1200 scholarships for graduating seniors. Applications will be available soon and again using easy to fill-in/print-out forms found on-line at www.sahuarocougarfoundation.org. Application deadlines are April 15.

**Mini-scholarships** are also offered to all students throughout the year for activities and enrichment programs. Faculty grants are offered to SHS teachers for classroom projects or other stated needs. For more information visit the Cougar Foundation Website: www.sahuarocougarfoundation.org .

The Cougar Foundation Faculty/Staff Scholarship for Continuing Education is an annual scholarship that provides \$500 to a Sahuaro High School faculty or staff member. The Faculty/Staff Scholarship provides much needed financial assistance to employees who wish to continue their education. To be considered, prospective candidates must have served at Sahuaro High School for at least two consecutive prior years. ## November 4, 2017, Cougar Foundation Hall of Fame Inductees; Annual Honorarium Held at Sahuaro High School

### DR. BRYAN FOULK - CLASS OF 1976

Nominated by Donald Rockliffe

Bryan Foulk is a 1976 (Spirit of '76) graduate, was a National Honor Society member, a three-year Letterman on the wresting team and was an outstanding shop student where he placed in the top five in the State of Arizona Plymouth Automobile Trouble Shooting Team.

Bryan Foulk became the person he was meant to be. His is a generous man with a heart to care. He is one who doesn't look to take -- but to put back good. It would be easy to note Bryan's successful dental practice, but more admirable is his many, many contributions to our community and his efforts to make our city stronger. For over 30 years, Dr. Foulk has donated time, dental skills and financial resources to numerous charities, including over one million dollars in cash and goods. Bryan has served to strengthen our valley by giving time and leadership to various committees, boards, and youth baseball and soccer organizations, including chairman and vice chairman elect of the Metropolitan Water District (second largest water provider in Southern Arizona), Public Policy Chairperson for Davis-Monthan-50 (which seeks to preserve jobs and strengthen the economy of Tucson), Southern Arizona Defense Alliance, Kids in Need Foundation, Youth On their Own (YOTO), and the list goes on.

As a result, Bryan has been named by Tucson Weekly as one of eight *Local Heroes of the Year* for his volunteerism, YOTO Man of the Year, United States Air Force as *Hometown Hero of the Year*, and much more.

Bryan continues to be a proud SHS Cougar and proud Tucsonan. At Sahuaro, it has been his non-attention seeking efforts throughout the decades like contributing resources and serving on reunion committees, and opening his home to hosting some of those reunions.

Bryan's heart has been enlarged – some of his traits not so hard to come by: hard work, ethics, and leadership, but most of all a spirit of benevolence born of generosity – a charitable heart! With a service-oriented nature, first instilled by his mother, he looks beyond himself and looks to give back – without looking to get back.

### Joey Ingegneri - Class of 1996

Joey developed from a mischievous little boy into a rebellious youth and then transforming into a compassionate, caring adult. The road has not all been a smooth one, but it has been inspirational.

Football and friends kept him interested in high school. Suffice it to say he was fiercely loyal to his friends and always "had their backs".

Within a year after graduation, he suffered a catastrophic car accident. Although doctors could stabilize him and save his life, it became apparent that there were going to be long-term implications due to his injuries including: possible paralysis below the waist and nerve damage to one or both arms. Not a good prognosis for a young man not yet 20 years old. Yet, this is where Joey began to be an inspiration to those who knew him. With the love and support of his close-knit family, Joey refused to just fold. He got out of the hospital, into a wheelchair and began to determine where he would go next. Joey struggled to redefine how his life would progress. The progression would be slow, incremental as well as painful, but always hopeful. He was determined to be as mobile as possible. Exercise and rehab allowed him to regain the use of his arms to the point that he could play in a wheelchair rugby league. Vehicles were retrofitted so that he could drive with his hands. Jackson Browne concerts and trips to Bourbon Street in New Orleans were once again regular activities. In short, he made every effort to get back to doing the things he did before his accident with no excuses, no complaints.

While Joey's inspiration to keep pushing on probably came mostly from his family in the early years after his accident, it was his marriage to his beautiful wife, Courtney, that pushed him to the accomplishments that qualify him for the Sahuaro Hall of Fame. Finally returning to school after working some years, he graduated with honors from the U of A with Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in the rehabilitation field in 2013.

After a very difficult pregnancy, Joey and Courtney were blessed with the birth of their daughter, Sicily. Sicily was born two months premature and Joey and Courtney spent most of their time nurturing this tiny miracle until she was released from the NICU. As with his own difficult experience, there was never a word about "why us?" — only love and support and perfect faith that "everything will be all right. Sicily is now a healthy, happy 3½-year-old who can now push little boys down with the best of them!

Despite the adversity Joey has faced in his own life, he has found time to give back to the community that he grew up in. He has been an active member of St. Pius X Church. His work with the Ronald McDonald House in Tucson has been

phenomenal. He has donated hundreds of hours of time working with this amazing charity. Joey is currently employed by the Jim Click Group. Mr. Click has always been active in the community promoting jobs and opportunities for Tucsonans with disabilities and now Joey successfully oversees those efforts with his own unique perspective.

It is believed that teachers influence students in ways that they will never know. In that sense, Joey is a testament to the faculty of Sahuaro High School in the mid-90s and his success, loyalty and compassion is a tribute to them as well as his parents.

### **NELLIE CHO WILLCOX - CLASS OF 1996**

Nellie Cho Willcox was an integral component of a wide variety of Sahuaro activities involving both students and faculty/staff members. Always striving to help others and make people feel comfortable, she creates an aura of optimism and exuberance. Her enthusiastic and infectious personality is genuine. Nellie is like the "Ever-Ready Bunny" in that she is always on the go at full speed and never seems to slow down. This is clearly evident when one examines all the roles and activities she was involved in while at Sahuaro. These include three terms as class president followed by student body president for her senior year; and four years of participation on the women's volleyball squad. She assumed numerous leadership roles, represented Sahuaro at local and state levels as a participant in Girls State and Anytown, received recognition as a Regents Scholar and was a recipient and participant of the Hugh O'Brien Youth Leadership Seminar. Her high energy and up-tempo drive continued at ASU where she served in various capacities such as Devil's Advocate Vice-President, a Resident Assistant and Orientation Leader. Nellie was also an intern for the American Cancer Society and became a cast member for a Walt Disney World College Program. A Summa Cum Laude graduate of the Barret's Honor College, Nellie became involved with the Student Alumni Association and then began pursuit of her career ambitions.

Nellie works for Sanofi Pharmaceuticals and represents the company with the highest degree of professionalism. She was responsible for promoting and informing physicians about several pharmaceutical products that were rated in the top ten worldwide. She excels in the company and maintains a very high level of respect, from her physician customers in the cardiovascular and diabetic marketplace.
